Changes

Describe how you obtained money, materials, supplies, and other needs (including donations) for your project.

The project was a long and difficult task, in order to do I needed money, supplies and tools to do the job. To raise money I held a candy sale fundraiser selling Hilliards chocolate bars and made \$900 from selling all the chocolate with some help (Not including expenses), I paid for all the chocolate (\$380) and reimbursed myself with only that amount. Which, in turn, gave \$520 towards the project to use for buying tools, materials and supplies needed to install a door, clean the attic and making the attic a clean space. Some of the tools we needed we did not have, such as saw horses and drill bits.
